Expository Paper: Film and Video

Due: Thursday, October 11th at the start of class

Referencing Emily's presentation, the film *Waste Land*, and Patricia Chavez' two short films *The Ties that Bind Us* and *#Whitina*, write an expository 3-5 page paper addressing the following questions. Note: in an expository paper it's necessary to make sure your thesis is clearly stated and that supporting evidence and examples are given. - 1. Discuss how documentary filmmaking differs from narrative filmmaking.
- 2. Can documentary filmmaking ever be objective?
- 3. What are the boundaries between documentary and narrative film?
- 4. What role can film play in society and how do "Wasteland" and #WHITINA address this issue?

Formatting + Stipulations

- 1. Papers need to be 3-5 pages in length, double-spaced, using Helvetica or Times New Roman, 12 pt font.
- 2. Absolutely, positively use spell check and grammar check! There is NO reason that there should be spelling mistakes in your paper.
- 3. Paper must include a bibliography (use MLA style), citing the assigned reading and any other articles or references you use.
- 4. Read the paper aloud (to yourself or friends). Is it easy to follow? Can your listener summarize your main parts? If not, you need to re-write sections to clarify your intentions.
- 5. Take your paper to the writing center to get advice from a writing specialist. It's recommended to visit either the GA for this class or the Writing Center as often as possible.
- 6. Papers must be turned in on time. For each hour you are late turning in your paper, you will lose 5 points.
- 7. Email a rough draft to me one week prior to the due date so you have time to make corrections and revisions as necessary.

*NOTE: It is expected that your paper will have gone through spell check and grammar check. If this is not the case you will earn no higher than a \underline{C} , no matter how good the quality of your paper.
